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Eurostat Outlier: Rising employment in the Romanian wood industry

The entire wood sector now accounts for about 230,000 jobs and is experiencing steady growth since the last depression.

Affected by the last global economic depression, the European wood processing sector has never managed to recover the jobs lost after the 2008 Wall Street disaster. In fact, the jobs have been in constant decline across the EU-28 states, according to the official EUROSTAT database, with very few exceptions. Of the 10 largest manufacturing countries, only Romania seems to exhibit a steady and sound growth in the job market for the wood processing sector (excluding furniture manufacturing).

At a steady pace, employment in the Romanian industry has grown by 16.7 % during the past 7 years, about 11,500 new positions being available at the end of 2016 compared to 2010. In stark contrast, the EU-28 job market fell by -10.4 % on average, from -4.7 % in Germany to a staggering -29.6 % in Italy and -41.7 % in Portugal. The French, Spanish, and Turkish job markets in the sector fell pretty abruptly as well, while the Czech Republic and Poland registered only nominal decrease, and the UK, nominal growth.

With its centuries-long tradition in wood-working, Romania is consolidating its top 5 place and may soon threaten to overtake Turkey for fourth. This remarkable growth is, no doubt, due to the constant investments, both foreign and domestic, that have spurred this prodigious spread.

Romania's forests are growing

During the past 15 years, Romania's forests grew by 4,950 km², an area larger than that of all national parks put together (3,200 km²). Between the years 2000 and 2015 the country's forested areas grew from 27.7% to 29.8%¹.
